

#### PREFERRED CHANNEL

Found at a junction of navigable channels, and indicates the preferred (primary) channel when entering from seaward. They are not numbered, but may be lettered.

**RANGES & DAY BOARDS** 

Range Dayboards are used in pairs to guide boats by visually aligning the pair, one in front of the other, and then following them into and through a navigable channel. Ranges may also be lighted.

### **SAFE WATER & ISOLATED DANGER**

Safe Water Aids are used to mark fairways, mid-channels and offshore points, and have unobstructed water on all sides. They often mark the beginning of a navigational channel.

Isolated Danger aids indicate an isolated danger that may be passed on all sides. Use caution when approaching.


